Ash Wednesday – February 17th, 2021

Worship Today - The mood of Ash Wednesday is solemn because it begins the 40 days of Lent, the season during which the Church remembers the passion and death of Jesus. During these 40 days Christians examine their lives and repent of the sin that sent the Savior to the cross. Our Ash Wednesday worship begins with the timeless right of the imposition of ashes, a solemn symbol that has deep roots and wide precedent in both the Old and New Testament. Ashes symbolize human mortality and the deserved destruction of all who sin. Like Job, believers throughout the ages repent in "dust and ashes." The symbol, joined to a right understanding of its meaning, emphasizes in a striking way the absoluteness and enormity of sin. Receiving ashes is not mandatory. This year, during COVID restrictions we will use a self-imposition of ash for yourself and your families with the words: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

THE GREETING

Brothers and sisters: God created us to experience joy in communion with M: him, to love all humanity, and to live in harmony with all his creation. But sin separates us from God, our neighbors, and creation, and so we do not enjoy the life our Creator intended for us. Also, by our sin, we grieve our Father, who does not desire us to come under his judgment, but to turn to him and live. Therefore, God in his mercy has sent our Lord Jesus Christ to take our place under the law, to suffer for us, and to die the death we deserve. God made Jesus, who had no sin, to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God. During the forty days of Lent we fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. The time of Lent reminds us that, in order to know Christ and the power of his resurrection, we must also know the fellowship of sharing in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death. As disciples of the Lord Jesus we are called to struggle against everything that leads us away from love of God and our neighbor. I invite you, therefore, to commit yourselves to this struggle and confess your sins, asking our Father for strength. Let us be silent. Let us be still. Let us pause now for a time of reflection and self-examination.

- M: We confess to you, Lord, all our past unfaithfulness. The pride, hypocrisy, and impatience in our lives:
- C: We confess to you, O Lord.
- M: Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, our exploitation of other people:
- C: We confess to you, O Lord.
- M: Our anger at our frustration, and our envy of those more fortunate than ourselves:
- C: We confess to you, O Lord.
- M: Our love of worldly goods and comforts, and our dishonesty in daily life and work:
- C: We confess to you, O Lord.
- M: Our negligence in worship and prayer, and our failure to show the faith that is in us:
- C: We confess to you, O Lord.

- M: Pardon us, Lord, for the wrongs we have done. For our blindness to human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty.
- C: Forgive us, O Lord.
- M: For what we think or say or do that is at variance with your will:
- C: Forgive us, O Lord.
- M: Restore us, O Lord, and let your anger depart from us:
- C: Hear us, Lord, for your mercy is great. Amen.

THE IMPOSITION OF ASHES

PRAYER

- M: Accomplish in us, O God, the work of your salvation.
- C: That we may show forth your glory in the world.
- M: By the cross and passion of your Son, our Lord,
- C: Bring us with all your saints to the joy of his resurrection.

THE EXHORTATION

M: Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, does not desire the death of sinners, but rather that they turn from their wickedness and live. Therefore, during these days of Lent we implore him to give us renewal and his Holy Spirit. May we continue to abide in true faith, and at the last be received by him through the merits of Jesus Christ, our Lord.

THE LESSON Luke 18:9-14

⁹ Jesus told this parable to certain people who trusted in themselves (that they were righteous) and looked down on others: ¹⁰ "Two men went up to the temple courts to pray. One was a Pharisee, and the other was a tax collector. ¹¹ The Pharisee stood and prayed about himself like this: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people, robbers, evildoers, adulterers, or even like this tax collector. ¹² I fast twice a week. I give a tenth of all my income.'

¹³ "However the tax collector stood at a distance and would not even lift his eyes up to heaven, but was beating his chest and saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!' ¹⁴ "I tell you, this man went home justified rather than the other, because everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted."

SERMON Luke 18:9-14

THE NICENE CREED
