


Rejoice in the Lord always! I will say it again: Rejoice! Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near.

Lighting of the Advent Candle (Joy)

The third candle on the Advent Wreath is the Shepherd Candle.

This candle symbolizes the "Coming" of the Savior into our hearts through faith in His Holy Word.

Even as the shepherds saw their Savior with their own eyes, and believed – so we see Him through the eyes of faith.

- M: We light the Shepherd candle, remembering Jesus, the Light of the World. He came to defeat the prince of darkness.
- C: We remember Jesus, who came in answer to his people's prayers.

 John proclaimed him the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world.
- M: I will raise up over them one shepherd, and he will tend them.
- C: My servant David will tend them, and he will be their shepherd. -Ezekiel 34:23
- M: Like a shepherd he will care for his flock.
- C: With his arm he will gather the lambs.
- M: He will lift them up on his lap.
- C: He will gently lead the nursing mothers.

Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.


For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and forever. Amen.



Amen.


